Back To In-Person Learning

Methuen High School--A familiar sight for some, but what may seem a distant memory for others.

Education is extremely important in the development of the human mind. It is vital for students to be in a school-like environment, engaging with their teachers and peers. This will allow students to receive a proper education and set them up for success in their future. However, this past school year, students have not had access to an ideal school atmosphere due to the implications of COVID-19.

Methuen High School has utilized the hybrid learning model for most of this year. They split up all the students into two groups and have had one group come in on Mondays and Tuesdays, while the other group comes in on Thursdays and Fridays.

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Wednesday acted as a fully remote day for everyone in order for the school to be cleaned. Many students decided to stay fully remote and not partake in the hybrid learning model.

Recently, Massachusetts made it a requirement for all students to eventually make a return to school in person, full-time. Methuen High School started to bring back its senior class starting April 5th. The following week, freshmen returned, and finally after April Break, juniors and sophomores came back to school.

With that being said, schools must still offer a fully remote learning model for students to participate in if they so choose. Methuen decided to send out a survey to families in the district to gather a rough estimate of how many students will be returning to school fully in person. According to those results, a vast majority plan to remain in the fully remote learning model.

A lot goes into making this kind of a decision, and clearly, many students and families are deciding against coming back to school in-person.

Methuen High School biotechnology teacher Mrs. Tobin explained her thoughts and concerns about the situation, saying, "I am very excited to have my seniors back but a little nervous about when all of the students come back full time. As with everything COVID related, there is a certain amount of anxiety that comes along with planning for so many kids to be in one place at the same time."

Mrs. Tobin's concerns are totally understandable, as she's nervous about students' ability to maintain social distance and stay focused on their schoolwork. She also acknowledges how Methuen has been in the "red" zone a while now and new COVID-19 variants are spreading fast. She responded, "I hope we are not moving too quickly and pushing too hard for all kids to be back in person."

Keeping these concerns in mind, it definitely won't be easy for Methuen High staff to watch over this many kids and make sure they are all doing the right thing and being safe. In a situation like this, it is important to incorporate the perspective of the students coming back to school as well.

One concern is that students are getting too comfortable doing school from their homes. This may not be the case for every student, but Methuen High senior Stephanie Ceballos admits that being at home for school is more comfortable and convenient for her.

Ceballos added, "It's going to be an adjustment going to school five days a week, but it makes sense since the last time we did was over a year ago."

She also believes that returning to school full-time will benefit her going into college. "I plan to go to a four-year university and I will be taking classes in person...I [will] have to wake up on time to get ready..."

Waking up early for school to close out her senior year will indeed help her prepare for college where she plans to attend UMass Lowell in the fall. Although she wasn't too excited to return to school at first, she's optimistic about seeing more familiar faces that she hasn't seen in over a year.

I personally have been very excited to return to school and be able to see some people I haven't interacted with since March of last year. I feel like going back to school five days per week will be a fresh start for me and I'll be able to engage with my teachers and peers to make the rest of my senior year unforgettable.

Despite how the remainder of this year goes, students will eventually have to start coming to school during the week like it used to be before COVID-19 hit. Might as well start getting used to it again now, right?

It will be essential to have as many students return to school as possible so they can receive the education they deserve.

Though it will be challenging to keep everyone safe with the implications of COVID-19, it is not impossible and if any school can do it, it's Methuen High School.

Covid-19 Vaccine Update

Nearly a year after the country was shut down from the COVID-19 outbreak, the U.S is finally distributing vaccines to citizens. At this stage the FDA has approved 3 companies vaccines for emergency use. But before you go and book your appointment there are some things you need to know going in.

The first company to receive the FDA approval was Pfizer, getting approved on December 11, 2020. The Pfizer vaccine is a two dose vaccine that is given 21 days apart at least. The vials for the vaccine must be stored in commercial grade freezers and once thawed the vials cannot be refrozen. This is a concern because of the amount of vaccines that may go to waste from people not showing up to vaccinations appointments. In the freezers the shelf life of this vaccine is up to six months. The Pfizer vaccine is more than 90% effective at preventing COVID-19 infection.

Now this vaccine has been available for some time now but was limited to ages 16 and older. Recently the company released information regarding the new age limit for the vaccine. This new trial revealed that the vaccine is safe for ages 12-15 as well. This is the first company to announce the safety of the vaccine for kids.

With any new vaccine there is always a risk of side effects. Based on your body's composition and other allergies your side effects may vary. The minimal side effects include pain at the injection site, headache, fatigue, and joint pain. The more severe side effects reported were fever, injection site swelling, and nausea.

The second vaccine to hit the market was produced from a company called Moderna. These two companies produced very similar vaccines as both of them are double doses. The Moderna vaccine protects against 94% of COVID-19 cases. The time period between the two doses is slightly longer than the Pfizer vaccine. The Pfizer protocol is 21 days while the Moderna is said to be a 28 day time period in between doses.

The other major difference is the shelf life. As noted earlier, Pfizer has to be stored at frigid temperatures and is only good in a standard refrigerator for only 5

days. Moderna stored at a lower temperature can be stored in a standard fridge for up to 30 days.

Finally the third vaccine on the market is the Johnson and Johnson Janssen vaccine. This vaccine is the only vaccine on the market that is a single dose. Johnson and Johnson received FDA approval for emergency use in late February of 2021. The Johnson and Johnson vaccine is the only vaccine to be 100% effective in the prevention of hospitalization and death from the virus, however according to the CDC, it was only 66.3% effective in preventing COVID-19 infections in clinical trials

Personally I received the Johnson and Johnson vaccine. In my mind a vaccine is better than no vaccine. Of course it is all personal opinion but before logging on to book your vaccine appointment do your research and be aware of all the possible risks and guidelines.

March is Women's History Month, and in celebration of this month, I will be listing and describing beautiful and powerful women in history and in the present. But not just any women--Hispanic women!

When discussing powerful Hispanic women, people may think of; Shakira, Gloria Estefen, and Jennifer López. All of them are very talented, but do you know who was the first Latina astronaut? Ellen Ochoa (born May 10, 1958, in Los Angeles, California). Ochoa is currently 62 years old. She was an American astronaut and administrator who was the first Hispanic woman to travel into space, in 1993. She later served as director of NASA's Johnson Space Center (2013–18). Ochoa was aboard the Discovery shuttle for a total of nine days while conducting important research into the Earth's ozone layer.

Another amazing woman I just had to put in is Selena Quintanilla. Known as the 'Queen of Tejano Music,' Selena Quintanilla was a beloved Latin recording artist who was killed by the president of her fan club in 1995 at the age of 23. Selena was born on April 16,1971, in Lake Jackson, Texas. Selena Quintanilla made her recording debut in the '80s, going on to become an award-winning recording artist in the Latin music scene with albums like *Amor Prohibido* and *Selena Live*. Selena will always be remembered in the hearts of the people who listened to her music and her story.

Lastly, but just as importantly, is Sonia Sotomayor, Associate Justice for the United States Supreme Court. She is currently a member of the United States Supreme Court and she is 66 years old. She was born in the Bronx, New York, on June 25, 1954.

In 1979, she earned a J.D. from Yale Law School where she served as an editor

of the Yale Law Journal. Then, she served as Assistant District Attorney in the New York County District Attorney's Office from 1979–1984. She then litigated international commercial matters in New York City at Pavia & Harcourt, where she served as an associate and then partner from 1984–1992.

In 1991, President George H.W. Bush nominated her to the U.S. District Court, Southern District of New York, and she served in that role from 1992–1998. She served as a judge on the United States Court of Appeals for the Second Circuit from 1998–2009. President Barack Obama nominated her as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court on May 26, 2009, and she assumed this role August 8, 2009.

There are so many more women to mention, but I could not possibly list all of the beautiful, hard-working, amazing Latin women in this article. This a reminder to give thanks to the women that made and still make a difference in our lives.

The Celtics have the most days of players missed because of COVID-19 protocols. By early April, Celtics players lost over 130 game days to COVID-19.



#StopAnti-AsianHate

The rise of Asian hate in America has recently become more prominent in society today, but when did it really start?

Some say it began with the rise of the COVID-19 pandemic. American citizens, whether it be ordinary people or those higher in power like the former president, Donald J. Trump, began to blame China for the rise of the virus. Soon after, people went after Asians living in America, blaming them for the spread of the virus in America. But, is this really where Asian hate began? Looking back in our history, Asian hate is something that has been going on for many years. One of the most noted Asian hate crimes was back in 1982, with the murder of Vincent Chin.

American man, living in Michigan, who
was murdered by two white autoworkers.
Their reasoning? Because Japanese
Americans were supposedly "taking all of
their jobs." Obviously, this was an AsianAmerican hate crime, and was known to be
one of the first things to spark people to
start rallying for justice against Asian hate.

With the crime being dated back all the way to the year of 1982, though, many young people today may never have heard of this happening. But for what reason? Is it simply because it was a long time ago? Or is it because people didn't take it seriously enough?

There is evidence that Asian hate crimes in America have risen ever since the pandemic started. People were starting to blame China for the creation of the Coronavirus, making claims that they were the ones at fault and that the virus was made in a laboratory in China, or that

people got them from eating bats from street vendors. This lead to Asian hate in America, citizens blaming Asian Americans for bringing the virus into the country and causing a catastrophic pandemic no one has ever seen before. It started out small, with people avoiding Asian Americans they see around them, avoiding Asian restaurants, and even glaring at them as they walk by. But this was only the beginning.

The advocacy group, Stop AAPI Hate, released statistics on data they had collected of Asian hate in Ar

collected of Asian hate in America ever since the beginning of the COVID-19 Pandemic. The report covers 3,795 incidents of Asian hate crimes starting from March 19th, 2020 to February 28th, 2021. According to the data, 68.1% of the discrimination against Asian Americans was verbal harassment, with 20.5% reported as shunning and 11.1% as physical assault. As bad as these incidents are, it is clear that the hate crimes do not end there.

On Tuesday, March 16th, eight women were found dead at an Atlanta, Georgia spa. Six of these women were Asian, leading to the public calling it an act of hate against Asian-Americans. The Atlanta police stated that it was unclear whether or not the murder was racially motivated, and were continuing to look into the matter. Many people were outraged. How was it that they were not sure if the murder was racially motivated? 6 out of the 8 women shot were Asian Americans. The shooter, Robert Aaron Long was known to have been to the spa before.

Thus began the beginning of #StopAsianHate. Of course, people had been advocating for the stop of Asian hate in America for much longer, but with the

spa shooting in Atlanta, many people were done keeping silent. People of all ages began spreading the word, posting information about the shooting on social media, journalists and news channels sharing the story, and giving out the information. People began to rally and have gatherings, protesting for the protection of the lives of Asian Americans, and spreading the word on social media on where to donate to those in need, what people can do to help.

Despite the outcry, though, the attacks continued. On Wednesday, March 31st in Manhattan New York, a 65-year-old Asian American woman was assaulted in broad daylight outside of an apartment building. Through viewing surveillance footage, police arrested 38 year old Brandon Elliot. This was only one of the many known Asian hate crimes not only against an Asian American, but an elderly Asian American. According to the report from Stop AAPI Hate, around 6.2% of the population of those who experienced hate crimes were above the age of 60.

Asian hate crimes have risen in the past year, most likely due to the worsening of the COVID-19 pandemic, though that wasn't the beginning of the hate crimes against Asians in general, as seen with the murder of Vincent Chin back in 1982. Spreading the word, protecting those in need, and working together are essential to ending these acts of hate towards people of color all across the country.

That is the question surrounding a new movie titled Music, directed by singer-songwriter Sia. The movie follows a newly sober Zu and her half sister Music, whom Zu becomes the guardian of. Music happens to be on the autism spectrum. With an 8% score on Rotten Tomatoes, this movie is under a lot of fire for the portrayal of the character Music.

Music, as previously mentioned, is on the autism spectrum. However, she is played by Maddie Ziegler, who is not. People were furious to find out that the character with autism would not be played by an actual person with autism. The disabled community has fought time and time again for more disabled characters

to be played by someone who actually has to deal with the conditions themselves.

When asked how they felt about the casting of an able-bodied actor, Astro, a member of the autistic community and friend of this reporter, stated that, "we continuously say that no one will understand more or make the portrayal more accurate than someone who has gone through these struggles." And it's not like it can't be done--directors often choose to cast able bodied people instead of people with the disability.

Another major critique of the film is the use of restraints when working with autistic people. Within the movie a particular restraint is shown to be the proper way to restrain an autistic person who is having some kind of breakdown.

This restraint is known as the prone restraint, where the upset party is maneuvered so they are laying face down on the ground, and then a caregiver or another person lays on the back, basically crushing them.

The prone restraint is not only incredibly dangerous but can in fact be deadly. According to health.vic.gov.au, in 2011 38 people died due to the use of this restraint. Sia's use of it within the movie on two different accounts is telling people this restraint is a proper way to restrain someone, when in fact it is not and has left many autistic people fearing for their lives.

In February 2021, Sia responded to backlash from the autistic community by promising on Twitter that future releases of the movie would remove the two restraint scenes.

This flawed depiction of autism shows that we as a society need to be better. We need to listen to the people who deal with these issues every day, instead of believing we know best. In the words of Astro, "our voices deserve to be heard and need to be heard."

Music is just one of the many examples of a society that has spoken over the voices of the people that need to be heard.

WandaVision was released on Disney+ on January 15 and ran for eight weeks. It is the first of several shows planned to be released in Marvel's current release phase. The nine episode long show follows Wanda Maximoff as she copes with the grief of the loss of her husband by creating a false reality. As the series progresses, the audience and Wanda learn more about her life and the true nature of her powers.

The show itself follows an interesting structure. The first seven episodes, excluding episode four, take inspiration from famous sitcoms over the decades. Episode one draws inspiration from the 1950's, and each episode following showcases another decade of American TV. Everything from the costumes to the opening themes were fitting for the period. This all occurs in the false reality Wanda created while the rest of the world exists in modern times. Meanwhile, as Wanda is living in her false reality, SWORD, a new agency, is working to uncover the secret of Wanda's reality and how to stop her. The final two episodes bring both of these worlds together as the audience learns about Wanda's past and speculate about her future.

The show earned a lot of praise from online fans and gained popularity across social media platforms. It seemed as though the show was always trending on Twitter after a new episode came out. In addition to the Twitter fame, the show led to the creation of several Tik Tok trends. These trends included dressing up from the different decades depicted in the show, dancing to the opening theme from the second episode, and making jokes about who to

blame for all of their problems by lip synching to the song "Agatha All Along". However, the most popular trend consisted of finding actor Randal Park, who portrayed the fan favorite character, F.B.I. Agent Jimmy Woo, in other movies or television shows.

Fan popularity has benefited the show greatly as it has already made several achievements. The show has been nominated for an award from the Directors Guild of America as well as two awards from the Scream Awards.

The show was gaining attention even before release. The trailer for the show had 53 million views in the first 24 hours after its premier, and the soundtrack to the show has also been reaching insane heights. The song "Agatha All Along" has been on both the iTunes and Billboard charts. The song debuted at No. 36 on the Billboard charts and has notched around 2 million streams on Spotify (as of the beginning of March).

In my opinion, the show is a wonderful showcase of what Marvel has to offer. It presented two Avengers who had often been overshadowed by big name heroes in the movies and made Marvel fans truly care about the characters. The show was very witty and had very comedic moments but kept the worldbuilding and action sequences fans have come to expect from Marvel projects.

However, at its core, the show is a depiction of grief and how it feels to lose a loved one. Wanda is not a perfect human being and though she does things that morally are not correct, it is easy to understand why she does it and you truly feel her pain. You go through the stages of grief with her and the ending of the show is both heartbreaking and sweet. It is truly a wonderful show that both older fans of the series and people who have had no prior interest in the franchise can enjoy.

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
