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### 3D printed Shark-Frogs Taking Over MHS?

Many future business leaders currently attend Methuen High School, but for sophomore Collin Henry, there is no 'future' in that title.

Collin's business, Shrog Co., has amassed a cult-like following in the walls of MHS selling his 3D printed figurines.

The most popular figurine sold is the shark-frog known as the "shrog". The namesake figurine was the first design they sold back in October 2023.

The company consists of Henry, the creator of the items, and six friends who work as salesmen, selling and distributing orders. Students choose their figurine's shape and color and Shrog, Co. delivers in school. Orders are placed over their Instagram or directly with these salesmen and almost all of the orders are fulfilled during school hours, in passing periods and lunch blocks.

So where did the business model come from? Henry explained that the concept came to him in a dream and he went from there. He sourced some designs from a CAD (computer-aided design) Creative Commons but he is the mastermind behind the printing and distributing. He invests the money made back into his interest and continues to expand his 3D printing paraphernalia.

On the future of the business, Collin stated his interest in expanding the sales into the online realm. He plans on selling his inventory through Amazon within the next year, which would exponentially increase the size of the company.

When fulfilling orders, the printing process is not perfect and there are many rejected products. The company's professional manner of business is important to Collin, who said, "[They] take pride in quality."

Massachusetts is a Democratic state that has not had a Republican presidential candidate since 1956 with Dwight Eisenhower. Candidates in the Republican party included Donald Trump and Nikki Haley.

Third party candidates included Robert F. Kennedy Jr. and Cornel West for the independent party, Chase Oliver for the Libertarian Party, and Jill Stein for the green party.

Lunar New Year is the celebration of the new year, however it's not the new year we all know, which is celebrated on January first.

Lunar New Year is based on a different calendar, the Lunar calendar. The Lunar calendar is based on the monthly cycles of the moon phases, and the holiday falls on the second new moon after the winter solstice. It falls on a different day every year in the months January and February. This year, 2024, Lunar New Year is on February tenth.

Every year has a different zodiac animal. 2024 is the year of the dragon. The holiday is often called Chinese New Year, but other countries celebrate it too, like Vietnam and Korea. On this day, families gather together and carry out many traditions throughout the day.

Lucky red envelopes are given out to the children to reward them for their hard work from the past year, and to wish them luck in the year ahead of them. Money is given to the younger generation and those who aren't married yet. Red is the color that represents luck, and all the decorations have red and gold on them.

Different cultures wear their own traditional clothing as well. Vietnamese people wear áo dài, Chinese men wear Tang suits, and women wear qipao or cheongsam. Korean people wear a hanbok.

During the celebration, there's always a large abundance of food. Vietnamese culture has many different types of food, such as banh bánh chưng, a sticky rice cake, thịt kho, which is braised pork belly, Ga luoc, which is a boiled chicken, and much more. Some foods the Chinese culture eats is a whole steamed fish, noodles, dumplings, and sticky rice balls. Some from Korean culture are tteokguk, a rice cake soup, dumplings, and japchae, a glass noodle stir fry dish.

There are also public celebrations. For example, there is Tết in Boston, celebrating Vietnamese New Year. In these events, there's always a lot of people and a lot of food. There are also performers who hold the dragon dances, or in Vietnamese culture, lion dances. Everyone gathers around to watch the performers go around in costumes and dance, often performing very acrobatic moves. The crowd can also offer money by putting it in the dragon's "mouth". Lanterns also go around to the people, and as decorations, making the scenery beautiful at night.

Lunar New Year is an event celebrated with families and friends, and can be celebrated many different ways along with yearly traditions.

Unlike a Sweet 16, a Quinceanera is filled with cultural traditions that symbolize different things. For example, at the start of the night, the Quinceanera begins with a shoe change from a sneaker or sandal, into a heel. This was represented by Marceli Reyes, Argentina Rosarío Castillo, and her cousin Alex Morales, and it symbolizes a transition from childhood to womanhood.

The second activity of the night was *El Valz* or "*The Waltz*", followed by *El Baile Sopresa* or "*The Surprise Dance*". These are danced by all members of the

## **Should MHS Switch to Trimesters?**

Trimesters or semesters? This debate has been recently brought up among school districts. MHS currently follows a semesterized system with two quarters in each semester, but what would a trimester system look like?

Following a trimesterized system can offer many advantages, but also many disadvantages. This leaves the question, should MHS switch to trimesters?

With trimesters, students have more flexibility in their schedules. They can choose to take different courses every trimester instead of taking the same course for two to four quarters. However, this does have setbacks. The curriculum of a course would have to be squeezed into one trimester instead of the typical two to four quarters, forcing students to keep up with a fast paced, college-like environment. This could really impact a student's mental health and grades.

Students enrolled in schools following a semesterised academic year cannot take as many electives as students enrolled in schools following a trimester based academic year. At MHS, most electives are half a year (though some are quarters), meaning you can only take two electives a year- at least as freshman or sophomore.

Juniors and seniors typically do have the flexibility in their schedules to take more than one elective in a semester.

Trimesters, on the other hand, allow for *everyone* to take three or more electives a year. Taking many electives can be really beneficial, as students can gain more experience in a subject and meet new people.

A couple of MHS students expressed their answer to the question, "Should MHS switch to trimesters?"

Freshman Michael Bulbian: "No, because most schools in the US have this (semesterised) system and it's much easier to navigate. But, I still think we shouldn't have year-long electives and should be

allowed to choose our own electives every quarter."

Sophomore Matthew Antunes: "Uh, no, I don't think MHS should switch to trimesters. Switching to trimesters would limit student options and interests because a trimester is limited to a rotation of three times while quarters are limited to four. This gives students four chances to experiment more electives, (mainly classes that are a quarter long). This will be good for students who still need to find interests in time for college."

Freshman Kai Irrizary: "No, we shouldn't."

Freshman Chloe Santarpio: "I think we should stick to quarters instead of switching to trimesters. Going by quarters helps a lot of us when parts (courses) of our schedule are going to change. Having quarters also shows us how much we progress throughout the year more than trimesters do."

Switching to trimesters would have a change on the way MHS operates. While there are many benefits to a trimesterized system, there are also many drawbacks. Whether MHS makes the switch to trimesters or not, it should be taken into account what works best for MHS' students and staff members.

### Should Phones be Banned in School?


